Lisa Curtis Senior Fellow and Director, Indo-Pacific Security Program, Center for a New American Security (CNAS)

Lisa Curtis is Director of the Indo-Pacific Security Program at the Center for a New American Security (CNAS). With over 20 years of service in the U.S. government, her work has centered on U.S. policy toward the Indo-Pacific and South Asia, with a particular focus on U.S.- India strategic relations; the Quad (U.S., Australia, India, and Japan); and China's role in the region. He is now chairman of the International Institute for Strategic Studies, of the board of Trinity College Dublin's Long Room Hub for Arts & Humanities, of the Japan Society of the UK, and of the International Trade Institute. Mr. Emmott is the author of 14 books on Japan, Asia, the 20th century and Italy. In 2017 he published "The Fate of the West". His latest book, "Japan's Far More Female Future", was published in Japanese by Nikkei in June 2019 and in English by OUP in 2020. He was presenter and co-author of a documentary about Italy, "Girlfriend in a Coma" (2013) and executive producer of "The Great European Disaster Movie" (2015), both shown on the BBC.

Kokubun has published and edited numerous English publications as well as Japanese, including: Japan-China Relations through the Lens of Chinese Politics (JPIC, 2021) and Japan-China Relations in the Modern Era (Routledge,

2017). He was awarded the Asia-Pacific Prize (Mainichi Shimbun) in 1997, the Suntory Prize (Suntory Foundation) in 2004 and the Kashiyama Prize (Kashiyama Foundation) in 2017.

Shi Zhiqin Professor, Tsinghua University; Executive Dean, Institute of the Belt and Road Initiative

Shi Zhiqin is executive dean of Institute of the Belt and Road Initiative, secretary general of Tsinghua Symposium, deputy director of the Think Tank Research Center of the SPPM, professor and doctoral supervisor of School of Social Sciences, Tsinghua University. He served as secretary of party committee of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences and director of the Department of International Relations, Tsinghua University. His part-time positions include Editor-in-Chief of Silk Road Encyclopedia, Vice-President of "the Belt and Road" Branch of the China Association of Higher Education. He is also the executive member of the Chinese Society for the History of International Communist Movement, and a member of Chinese Association for European Studies. His research fields include the Belt and Road Initiative, international relations, comparison of party and government, European party politics and China-EU relations. He has published hundreds of academic articles and critical articles, and his representative works include The Transformation of the Italian Communist Party and The Political Change in Italy, Globalization and The Transformation of the European Social Democratic Party.

★Kenichiro Sasae President, The Japan Institute of International Affairs (JIIA)

Andrey Kortunov Director General, the Russian International Affairs Council (RIAC)

Andrey Kortunov graduated from the Moscow State Institute of International Relations (MGIMO) in 1979 and completed his postgraduate studies at the Institute for U.S. and Canada Studies of the USSR Academy of Sciences in 1982. He holds a PhD in History. Dr Kortunov completed internships at the Soviet embassies in London and Washington, and at the Permanent Delegation of the USSR to the UN. In 1982–1995, Dr Kortunov held various positions in the Institute for U.S. and Canada Studies, including Deputy Director. He taught at universities around the world, including the University of California, Berkeley. In addition, he led several public organizations involved in higher education, social sciences and social development. Since 2011, Andrey Kortunov has been the Director General of RIAC. lan Lesser is vice president of GMF and a member of its executive team. He also serves as executive director of the Brussels office and leads the organization's work on transatlantic relations involving the Mediterranean and Turkey. His expertise includes US foreign policy and European and Middle Eastern security affairs. Prior to joining GMF, Lesser was a public policy scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, vice president and director of studies at the Pacific Council on International Policy, and, for more than a decade, a senior analyst and research manager specializing

O Yose Rizal Damuri Executive Director, Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS)

Yose Rizal Damuri is the Executive Director, Centre for Strategic and International Studies. Michael Green Professor and CEO, US Studies Centre, The University of Sydney

Dr. Michael J. Green is Professor and CEO at the US Studies Centre at the University of Sydney. He is also the Kissinger Chair (non-resident) at the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington, DC where he previous led programs as the Senior Vice President for Asia while concurrently directing Asia Studies as Professor and Chair in Modern and Contemporary Japanese Politics and Foreign Policy at Georgetown University. Dr. Green served as Director and then Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs and Senior Director for Asia on the National Security Council staff from 2001 through 2005. His publications include By More than Providence: Grand Strategy and American Power in the Asia Pacific since 1783 (2018) and Line of Advantage: Japan's Grand Strategy in the Era of Abe Shinzo (2022). He hosts the podcast The Asia Chessboard, serves on the Boards of The Asia Foundation and Radio Free Asia, and is Senior Advisor for The Asia Group consultancy.

O Qingguo Jia Professor, Peking University

Jia Qingguo is professor and former dean of the School of International Studies of Peking University. He received his Ph.D. from Cornell University in 1988. He is a member of the Standing Committee of the National Committee of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference. He is vice president of the China American Studies Association, vice president of the China Association for International Studies, and vice president of the China Japanese Studies Association. He has published extensively on US-China relations, relations between the Chinese mainland and Taiwan and Chinese foreign policy.

Sunjoy Joshi Chairman, Observer Research Foundation (ORF)

Mr. Sunjoy Joshi heads the Observer Research Foundation (ORF) in New Delhi as its Chairman and Chief Executive. He has over the last 10 years spearheaded the rise of the ORF as India's premier think tank and window into the world of Global Affairs. He joined the Madhya Pradesh Cadre of the Indian Administrative Services in 1983. Took premature retirement in 2009 in order to pursue his academic interests. He has been Visiting Associate at the International Institute of Strategic Studies, London and Distinguished Visitor to the Program on Energy and Sustainable Development,

University of Stanford, USA. He speaks, publishes and comments on the world of technology, energy, and development, framing them in the context of global shifts and the challenges to growth and employment faced by emerging economies. Has a regular Youtube commentary on Global and Current Affairs called India's World which is also available as a podcast.

O Rory Medcalf Head of College, National Security College, Australian National University

Professor Rory Medcalf AM is Head of the National Security College at the Australian National University. His career spans diplomacy, academia, intelligence analysis, journalism and think tanks, including with the Lowy Institute. Professor Medcalf was a senior strategic analyst with the Office of National Assessments, Australia's peak intelligence agency, and a diplomat with service in India, Japan and Papua New Guinea. Thierry de Montbrial is Executive Chairman of the French Institute of International Relations (Ifri), which he founded in 1979. He is Professor Emeritus at the Conservatoire National des Arts et Métiers. In 2008, he launched the World Policy Conference. He has been a member of the Académie des Sciences Morales et Politiques of the Institut de France since 1992, and is a member of a number of foreign Academies. Thierry de Montbrial chaired the Department of Economics at the Ecole Polytechnique from 1974 to 1992. He was the first Chairman of the Foundation for Strategic Research (1993-2001). Entrusted with the creation of the Policy Planning Staff (Centre d'Analyse et de Prévision) at the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs, he was its first director (1973-1979). He has authored more of twenty books, several of them translated in various languages, including Action and Reaction in the World System. The Dynamics of Economic and Political Power (UBC Press, Vancouver, Toronto, 2013) and Living in Troubled Times.: A New Political Era (World Scientific, 2018). He is a Grand Officier of the Légion d'honneur, Grand Officier of the Ordre National du Mérite. He has been awarded the Order of the Rising Sun – Gold and Silver Star, Japan (2009) and other state honors by the French and several foreign governments. Thierry de Montbrial is a graduate of the Ecole Polytechnique and the Ecole des Mines, and received a Ph.D. in Mathematical Economics from the University of California at Berkeley.

Menichiro Sasae President, The Japan Institute of International Affairs (JIIA)

Kenichiro Sasae joined the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs after graduating from The University of Tokyo in 1974. His distinguished and illustrious diplomatic career includes prestigious assignments as Executive Assistant to the Prime Minister, Director-General of the Economic Affairs Bureau, Director-General of the Asian & Oceania Affairs Bureau, and Vice Minister for Foreign Affairs. During his period of service in Tokyo, he represented the Japanese Government in the Six-Party Talks on North Korean issues. He also worked as Political Director for the G-8 Summit. From 2012-2018, he was Ambassador of Japan to the United States. Subsequently, in June 2018, Ambassador Sasae was appointed President of The Japan Institute of International Affairs to head Japan's premier foreign affairs think tank.
